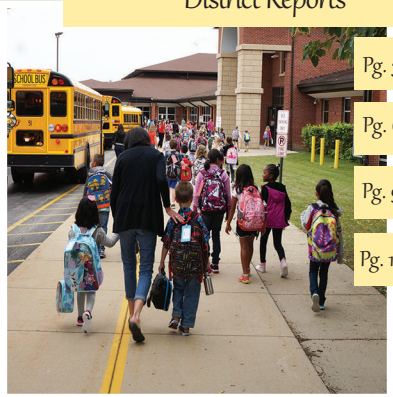

Mayor's Message

Dear Residents,

This past month, we experienced the worst flooding in Gurnee's history. The Village received nearly 6.4" of rain in a 24 hour period, leading to hundreds of basements taking on water and the Des Plaines River reaching a record breaking level of 12.09' on July 16th. The previous record of the Des Plaines River Level was 11.95' in 1986. The event was devastating for the homeowners and businesses impacted and some have suffered crippling financial losses. These wonderful people need our thoughts and prayers to sustain them as they've started recovery and rebuilding. It was hard on all of us to see our beautiful Village Center underwater and streets all over the Village lined with homeowners' flood-damaged belongings.



As difficult as it was to see the damage caused by the flooding, I am truly awestruck by the overwhelming response and support from the community members who volunteered to assist with the emergency response. Community spirit always shines brightest after a disaster and nowhere more so than here in Gurnee. From the bottom of my heart, I would like to send my deepest thanks to everyone who is a part of ensuring the safety and recovery of areas impacted. I especially want to thank the many volunteers who selflessly gave their time under extreme conditions to help others. We are truly blessed to live in this great community and these people and businesses are the reason why I am so proud to be leading the Village forward with our team and the Village Board.

I also want to give recognition and thank the Village staff who were prepared and mobilized quickly to have our Emergency Operation Center up and running. Sandbag operations were swiftly put in to place to protect structures and assist residents and businesses.

While this was a historic flood for our area, it would have been much worse if not for the diligence the Village has practiced the last 20 years in enforcing the Watershed Development Ordinance. The Village will also continue to set aside funding each year to purchase properties from willing owners and return it to open space. This program has allowed the Village to remove 26 properties and the Gurnee Grade School from the floodplain.

Now that the river has receded and school is almost in session, the community gets a chance to come together in August and celebrate Gurnee Days. It's always a fun time for us to gather and enjoy quality time with our families and each other's company. The Gurnee Days Corporation planned a wonderful weekend of activities and celebration that I hope you enjoyed. I'd like to also thank the Gurnee Days Corporation for selecting me as the Gurnee Days Honoree this year. I sincerely enjoy serving the residents and businesses of Gurnee, and the recognition means the world to me. Gurnee Days is my favorite weekend of the year since it gives me a chance to talk and engage with so many of you and hear about what is important to keeping our community the best place to live, work and play. This year it was double fun as Mayor and Gurnee Days Honoree!

New Improvements Sprouting on East Grand

Following the East Grand Avenue Corridor study conducted by Urban Land Institute in 2016, the revitalization of the area has taken root.

The Village's FY 17/18 Approved Budget contains \$100,000 for improvements to the East Grand Corridor. These improvements include new landscaping beds featuring flowering bushes and perennials, planted in late July. The 5-foot-wide planting beds are installed adjacent to the sidewalks in front of East Grand businesses. A portion of the plant material was purchased locally from Gurnee Garden Center.



UHaul recently opened a temporary facility in the former Handy Andy building, offering truck and trailer rental and the sale of moving supplies; plans are in the works for renovation to an interior, climate-controlled self-storage facility. New ownership at 3545-3575 Grand Avenue has unveiled plans for a future facade renovation. East Grand Avenue businesses and residents are also helping sow the seeds of change! Emerald Ash Borer

Have you seen parkway trees with a multi-colored ribbon this summer?

These ribbons are being placed by our forestry crews on parkway ash trees that have already been treated this season for Emerald Ash Borer. The ribbon marks to our crews an easy to identify sign that the tree has been pre-treated.

Once the 2017 treatments are completed, crews will remove the ribbons. Trees marked with an "X" are slated for removal, due to either the progression of the Emerald Ash Borer infection or other factors causing the tree to be a safety concern if not removed.

Gurnee Mills Gives Back with 'Bucks for Books'



In January of this year, Gurnee Mills launched their inaugural 'Bucks for Books' program. The new initiative worked as a fundraiser for all public schools in Gurnee. Families were encouraged to shop Gurnee Mills and turn in their receipts, designating the Gurnee school of their choice to receive a point for every dollar spent.

Schools received a combined \$10,000 from Gurnee Mills. At a May 22nd awards ceremony, River Trail School won \$3,500 for first place, Woodland Elementary East placed second and received \$2,500 and Woodland Primary was awarded \$1,500 for third place. School officials reported the prize money will be used to support various underfunded programs including STEM, Positive Behavioral Interventions & Supports (PBIS) and to update multimedia resources. Other schools receiving awards were Spaulding Elementary School with \$1,000 for fourth place and Woodland Intermediate and Prairie Trail Elementary each with \$750 awards.

"Continually looking for opportunities to give back and strengthen the community in which we live, work and shop, we were delighted to present Gurnee schools with these well-deserved funds," said Randy Ebertowski, General Manager of Gurnee Mills. "The program also served as a reminder to local families that when they 'shop local,' two cents of almost every dollar spent goes back into the community to support vital public services."

Bucks for Books v2.0 is back for the fall semester. Starting September 1st, Gurnee schools will again begin collecting receipts, earning a point for each dollar spent at Gurnee Mills. Shop local and support your Gurnee schools!

Woodland's First Relocation Drill Successful

Keeping students safe at school is a top priority for Woodland District 50, and on May 17 school officials went further than the usual safety drills to conduct our first drill involving relocating students.

In close cooperation with the Gurnee Police Department and the Lake County Sheriff's Office, Woodland orchestrated a morning drill wherein approximately 1,280 fourth and fifth grade students and their classroom teachers were moved from Woodland Intermediate to Woodland Middle School. Students were bused to the temporary location and then returned to complete their school day in approximately one hour.



"We are committed to providing a safe and secure learning environment for students and that means practicing for all types of safety situations," said Mike Witkowski, Principal at Woodland Intermediate School.

Relocating students away from potential harm may occur if there is an emergency that could include, but not be limited to a gas leak, loss of water or a dangerous situation inside the schools. In a real relocation, parents would be informed where to collect their children, but that aspect of the drill was not done with the exercise. Plans are to include the reunification portion in a future drill.

Woodland Impacts Student Academic Growth

Woodland is seeing a consistent trend of students scoring better than the national average in reading and math on the growth test developed by the Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA) called the Measures of Academic Progress (MAP). This test also shows our eighth grade class progressed while at Woodland as they started in second grade at the 71st percentile nationally in reading and the 48th percentile in math. Upon leaving Woodland, they are averaging at the 82nd national percentile in reading and the 83rd national percentile in math.

Woodland's individual student growth is also increasing. Nationally, 50% of students taking MAP will reach their target. Grade levels with 60% of the students reaching or exceeding their individual growth is considered "High Growth." In reading, four of the seven grade levels, utilizing MAP, had their highest percentage of Woodland students reaching their individual growth target over the last three years with three of those grade levels reaching the "High Growth" level. This is the most over the last three years. In math, four of the seven grade levels had their highest percentage of Woodland students reaching their individual growth target over the last three years. And four of those grade levels reached the "High Growth" level. This is also the most over the last three years. We are pleased to see the success of each student's individual growth.

Darlene Lipczynski Named "Gurnee Teacher of the Year"



When Darlene Lipczynski was surprised in class with news that she is Woodland District 50's Gurnee Teacher of the Year for 2017, her students reacted by cheering and chanting "1, 2, 3 - Lipczynski."

An educator for 16 years at Woodland District 50, Lipczynski, an English Language Arts teacher, spent the past four years at Woodland Middle School and the previous 12 years teaching third grade at Woodland Elementary School.

"My philosophy of teaching is really the same as any other educator; give children a voice and provide a safe place to use that voice. Advocate for them when they can't advocate for themselves. Validate their thoughts and feelings and make sure they know they have value and worth. Educate the whole child by giving them the tools to be successful, academically, socially and emotionally," she said.

Woodland District 50 Superintendent Dr. Joy A. Swoboda and Middle School Principal Scott Snyder surprised Lipczynski in her classroom with the news. "Darlene Lipczynski is a selfless advocate for children inside and outside of the classroom. Not only does she continue to strive to provide new learning opportunities for her students, but she also works to ensure students feel included in the school. Though she is not one to seek out recognition, she is so deserving of accolades for her contributions as a caring educator," Swoboda said.

Lipczynski added, "I am only the sum of all the dedicated teachers that I have the honor to work with. I am inspired everyday by all the amazing and dedicated teachers, who spend tireless hours, without agenda, for the sole purpose - their students."

Woodland Inspires Expands to Fourth, Fifth Grades

Imagine doing a book report on “The Titanic” where you can write a script from the viewpoint of a passenger on the fateful journey, record audio using the script and then use a screen cast with images of the real event while giving the report.



Students at Woodland Intermediate School did that last school year as they piloted laptops, better known as Chromebooks. Through “tradigital” learning in our Woodland Inspires initiative, a lesson such as a book report can come alive when traditional research and writing is used in conjunction with audio and video provided through the Chromebooks.

“Woodland Inspires is not just a technology program. It is a learning program. The technology allows teachers and students to enhance their collaboration, communication, critical thinking and creativity in their learning. Each teacher chooses when it is best to use traditional tools and when it is more appropriate to use Chromebooks,” said Dr. Steve Thomas, Assistant Superintendent of Teaching and Learning at Woodland District 50.

The goal in the recently concluded strategic plan for Woodland is to increase student access to technology. All sixth through eighth grade students received Chromebooks at the start of the 2016-2017 school year, and all fourth and fifth grade students will receive Chromebooks at the start of the 2017-2018 school year. For Woodland, that means more than 3,400 students will have Chromebooks. Even the Kindergarten through 3rd grade students will benefit from the 1:1 effort because equipment used in computer labs settings in our 4th through 8th grade schools is being shifted to the primary and elementary schools so those children have more opportunities to use technology.

Through Chromebooks, students can not only tap into digital resources, but they can also complete assignments and quizzes, organize tasks and communicate electronically with their teachers, collaborate with classmates and easily investigate creative new ideas. Woodland primarily uses two digital tools: Googledocs, which allows for shared documents, and Schoology, for assignments and online learning with the added benefit of allowing parents to check on what their child is working on and how they are doing.

New Look and Function Coming to Woodland Website

Visitors to the Woodland District 50 website, www.dist50.net, will be greeted October 1 with a new look and new functions due to a significant change in how information is delivered. With input from parents and staff, the new website will feature many familiar headings, with an emphasis on more images and videos of students, a social media feed, quick links to frequently used web pages and easier viewing through the use of a Woodland mobile application.

The process has been two years in the making and the result will include not only a website but also a phone application that will include a calendar to integrate with parents’ existing electronic calendars on their mobile devices. Blackboard will be hosting the website at an annual cost of \$23,500, but due to savings from the program currently being used, there is no increase in the technology budget to provide the new website.

Strategic Plan Update

Superintendent Dr. Joy Swoboda in June provided highlights of the strategic plan and district goals to the Board of Education, adding that the 2016-2017 school year concludes implementation of the five-year plan. In those five years, 26 initiatives were carried out, including but not limited to the following:

- Creating full-day kindergarten
- Updating curriculum in all subjects to align with Common Core Standards
- Creating a Dual Language program in kindergarten - 4th grades
- Developing Woodland Inspires 1:1 technology initiatives in 6th - 8th grades with 4th and 5th grades starting in the 2017-18 school year
- Starting a breakfast program for all students
- Updating the long-range financial and facility plan

District 56 "Teacher of the Year" Mr. Frank Fitzgerald

The Gurnee District 56 Teacher of the Year was Mr. Frank Fitzgerald. Mr. Fitzgerald just completed his 21st year as a teacher in the District. Whereas some teachers repeat the same experience year after year, Mr. Fitzgerald has improved upon his work each year that he has taught.

He is an art teacher at Spaulding School and is also an artist himself. Not only does Mr. Fitzgerald do a good job in creating budding artists, he also accepts the challenge to provide students instruction in mathematics and reading as part of the art curriculum. The District has encouraged its teachers to understand the need to provide all students additional experiences in reading and mathematics to ensure that every child is working at grade level in those two discipline areas. Mr. Fitzgerald has not only accepted that challenge, he has emerged as a leader in advocating for all students to receive a well-rounded education.

With the immersion of instructional technology in this District, Mr. Fitzgerald now incorporates the iPad in most class lessons. The District continues to be amazed at the artistic abilities of its students and is very impressed that many of their designs are completed electronically. Mr. Fitzgerald is a teacher leader in the District and possesses the "Spirit of 56".

Summer Lunch Program

Gurnee District 56 and the Gurnee Park District have partnered to offer summer lunches for students from economically disadvantaged families. Those students are provided free lunches during the school year to ensure that they receive a nutritious lunch every school day. That goal does not become less important during the summer months, and the District is proud to partner with the Gurnee Park District to continue lunch services for families during the summer months.

The program started on June 20th with only two students taking advantage of it. On June 27th, plans were being made to prepare 50 lunches for the following week. The early success of the program shows that some families needed additional assistance during the summer months and is a clear message to all involved that this program needs to be expanded next year.



The School and Park Districts have partnered on several programs (e.g., the extension of Viking Park and the new playground at River Trail School) over the last few years with the goal to combine resources in order to provide better services for all families in this community.

STEM Education and Makerspace

An interesting aspect of education in the last 40 years is the cyclical nature of pedagogical trends. In the 70s, open concept schools and individualized learning were buzz words in education. Service learning and authentic assessments were trends in the 90s. Home economics and industrial arts were popular in the 90s and early 2000s. All of those concepts are back in vogue now and are important aspects of future ready schools.

Why are those trends more viable in 21st century schools? Technological advances have allowed us to more fully implement them. At District 56 this year, a concerted effort was made to bring personalized learning to Viking School when the District remodeled its library to include a STEM lab and a makerspace; the results so far have exceeded its expectations. In fact, things have progressed so well that River Trail School has a makerspace in their library, and Prairie Trail School has started the process of developing a makerspace in their library too. Both of these projects were implemented earlier than expected based on the successes at Viking School.

Students are now asked to be not only problem solvers, but also problem finders. In many classrooms, students are asked to identify problems in their schools and communities and develop a solution to solve, or reduce the impact of, the problems (service learning). STEM labs are being used to test solutions (authentic learning), and makerspaces are being used to build mechanisms (career tech/CTE) to solve problems.



Student Programs

Computer Science and Coding

Code to the Future trained Gurnee 56 K-2 teachers on using Legos to help students integrate computer science concepts. The District selected Code to the Future to partner with because their basic philosophy that coding should not be a stand alone course of study, but instead a tool to learn curriculum in all subject areas. During the first semester, the District used Scratch Junior to assist students in sequencing ideas and developing deductive reasoning skills. Two schools hosted a Parents Night to show the work of its youngest students. Students completed an “epic build” to demonstrate mastery of course content with the use of coding. K-2 students used Legos/Lego robotics to continue computer science work. Teachers were trained on integrating Legos into their classrooms to help students develop a programming mentality.

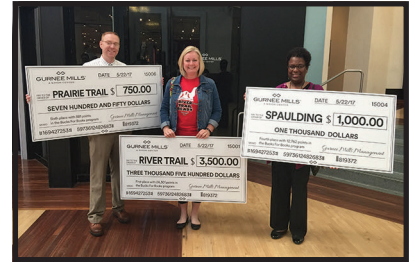
District teachers gave important feedback on how coding impacted learning for students. Without exception, they felt that the students are much more knowledgeable about computer science concepts than they were and are very willing to learn with the students. Programming is a tool that will serve our students well in their futures and was not in our curriculum until this year. One of our bilingual teachers said, “Coding is a universal language, and all children are working from a level playing field.” That comment extends beyond language and includes ethnicity and students from poverty. This initiative moves the District a step closer to its mission, “An education that inspires... opportunities for ALL.”

Partnerships and Educating All Children

“It takes a Village” is a phrase used to describe the importance of the “all in” philosophy necessary when educating all children. As part of a Professional Learning Community, by definition, every adult who is part of the Gurnee District 56 school community is responsible for the education of every child. By extending that definition beyond the school walls and into our community and beyond, the District has attempted to enlist as many partners as possible in offering all children a world-class education.



'Bucks for Books'

- Otus is providing the District the functionality to create a data warehouse that will provide teachers a unique profile of all students based on the test data accumulated from them over the years. Their data warehouses will protect the confidentiality of student data and will prove to be a critical part of personalized learning for all students.
- Warren Township High School is working with the District to provide all parents access to their children’s busses through an integrated GPS.
- Fanning Howey is working with Mr. Sean Smith to help the District reduce energy consumption.
- Gurnee Park District has partnered with the District to give River Trail School students new playground equipment and a summer lunch program to economically disadvantaged students.
- Nutrition First is a new partner this year. They provide all families hot lunch options for their children.
- Foresters Financial is also a new partner this year. They have provided an awesome breakfast option to those District students who have the greatest need.
- Warren Newport Public Library is another new partnership that has been established to provide all District 56 students access to a library card.
- Gurnee Mills Mall partnered with the District in a “Books for Bucks” event. The District received over \$5,000 from the Mills to educate children.

Gurnee District 56 is very excited about all of these partnerships and the impact each will have on our children’s educational experiences.

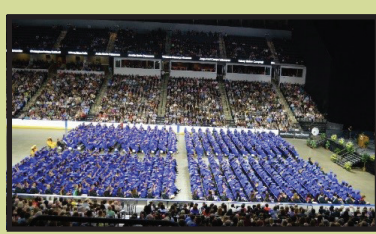
Chris Mason

Strategic About Fun

In 2017 the Gurnee Park District approved its Strategic Plan to guide the district through 2022. After conducting several community planning meetings and interviewing community leaders and stakeholders, seven initiatives emerged and will set the direction for the future of Gurnee parks and recreational programming.

The first, Excellence in Parks and Facilities, outlines the ways in which the district plans to maintain and update 28 park sites, 2 community centers, an outdoor aquatic center and spray pad and FitNation, a 75,000 sq. ft. fitness facility. The second initiative is focused on delivering exceptional programs and services. The District offers a full day preschool, swim school, studio dance and youth and adult sports leagues serving more than 26,000 participants annually through these registration-based activities. The District will be investigating new athletic opportunities, greater flexibility and access to participation, as well as introducing new, innovative and/or trending programs that match the community's interests.

Third is to be a leader in promoting health and wellness in the community. Responding to national trends of parks becoming an influence on community health and wellness, the District has the open space acreage and experience in sports and fitness to change negative health trends. Further, Gurnee Park District prides itself on its strong intergovernmental relations and community engagement and intends to maintain and expand the strong relations that currently exist while targeting residents not currently served by programs and volunteer opportunities as part of the fourth initiative.

The fifth initiative, Effective Communications, Marketing and Customer-friendly processes will focus on ways the district can deliver first class customer service while the sixth and seventh initiatives are focused on financial stability and highly engaged staff, fundamentals that are necessary to the long-term sustainability of the district.

Overall, the plan is focused on maintaining stability and fostering adaptability to meet the present and future needs of the community. Million Steps in the Right Direction

GO Gurnee is wrapping up its second summer as a community walking movement taking more than a million steps in a healthier direction.

Inspired by a presentation and challenge from former Surgeon General, Vivek K. Murthy, to encourage more movement among US residents, the Gurnee Park District set out to find out what might happen when they recruited nearly 100 influential Gurnee leaders and local businesses to get walking for at least 30 minutes a day and to encourage others to do the same. Susie Kuruville, Gurnee Park District Executive Director, challenged the park staff to find ways to get Gurnee residents moving after learning that nearly 60% of the community is overweight or obese. She echoed the sentiments of Murthy, "that simply walking is one of the easiest ways to make a positive lifestyle change and improve a person's health and well-being".



The results have been remarkable. To date, GO Gurnee has been the host to two spring community walks with hundreds of residents in attendance including the addition of furry friends in 2017; a Pokemon Go walking event combining technology and walking; Stories and Strollers, a self-guided story walk through the park in partnership with the Warren Newport Library; Walk with the Mayor, an alternative to Coffee with the Mayor; and several "pop-up" events leading walks for area church groups like Bethel Lutheran. It is easy to tell who is supporting the movement by many men, women and children wearing the highly recognizable bright blue Go shirt and furry friends wearing orange bandanas around town, including a dedicated group of 20+ walkers who meet each Saturday at a new outdoor location as part of the GO Gurnee Walking Club.

With over two hundred and fifty champions to date and countless participants, GO Gurnee is also moving in directions beyond the individual. Park officials have been working with the Gurnee Walkability Committee to elevate the priority of improving pedestrian access and connectivity throughout the Village. GO Gurnee has partnered with Live Well Lake County, a Lake County Health Department initiative, to package the movement in such a way that all Lake County communities can model active efforts in their areas.

Additionally, the Lake County Department of Transportation is exploring a partnership with the GO movement to assist in the dissemination of pedestrian education. Both Waukegan and Antioch have also launched their own GO movements with similar success and inquiries are coming in from coast to coast as other recreation agencies and public agencies are looking for a dynamic way to change the activity level of their residents .

Park District Financially Sound and Ready for the Future

It is a priority of Gurnee Park District to sustain long-term financial strength. For the past 19 years, Gurnee Park District has received a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting from the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada (GFOA) for its comprehensive annual financial report (CAFR). The Certificate of Achievement is the highest form of recognition in the area of governmental accounting and financial reporting, and its attainment represents a significant accomplishment by a government and its management.

Further, the District also receives the Government Finance Officers Association of the United States and Canada's (GFOA) Distinguished Budget Presentation Award annually. In order to receive the award, the District had to satisfy nationally recognized guidelines for effective budget presentation. These guidelines are designed to assess how well the budget serves as a policy document, financial plan, operations guideline and communications device.

The Park District has managed a balanced budget for many years and continues that financial policy through all economic conditions. The Park District's main revenue sources are fees and charges for services and property taxes. Just over 60% of the revenue collected by the Park District is through fees and charges for services and sources other than property taxes. This revenue diversity is very important to the continued financial strength of the Park District. The District also relies on grants/intergovernmental agreements and developer impact fees to fund its capital growth. This past year, Gurnee Park District collected a total of \$14M in revenue.

Additionally, the Park District spent \$10.8M on operating expenditures with an additional \$1.3M spent on capital projects and \$2.4M on debt service during this past year. Gurnee Park District is committed to using our financial resources consistent with the Park District vision: As a nationwide leader in our field, be the premier provider of community driven and innovative park and recreation experiences, while maintaining financial stability. The Park District is able to achieve our vision as well as continue the "standard of excellence" in our services while maintaining financial strength.

Packages vary from General Admission for \$40, VIP for \$75 and Designated Driver for \$10 (includes unlimited soda and water). General Admission and VIP ticket holders receive 20 sampling tickets, and all ticket holders receive a commemorative glass and unlimited entry to the grounds.

As we strive to make the festival bigger and better each year, the event has shown tremendous growth and is developing a dedicated following. From the fest's beginning in 2015 to last year's 2016 event, guest attendance increased by 30%, over 1,600 people, and brewer attendance increased from 38 to 53. In the first two years, the event raised over \$45,000 for the Legion and \$11,600 for Honor Flight. Our goal this year is to keep expanding so we may better serve the missions of our beneficiaries. Through the partnership of founding organizations the Village of Gurnee, Timothy O'Toolé's, the Gurnee American Legion, Gurnee Mills, 102.3 XLC and Lake County Honor Flight, we hope to reach our goal and look forward to the future of the Legions of Craft Beer Fest.

Flood Recovery

The Lake County area was hit with an unprecedented rain fall event on Wednesday, July 12th. The event had an immediate impact on homes and businesses due to the record amounts in a short amount of time. Over 400 homes in Gurnee have reported that they took on water and were damaged from the rainfall. In the days to follow, the Des Plaines River continued to rise and impact homes and businesses in the vicinity of the river. Village crews responded by mobilizing volunteers to assist with sandbagging, closing roads impacted by flooding and activating the Emergency Operations Center to answer calls and ensure the safety of the community.

Blue Ribbon Commission Recommends Improvement Plan for Gurnee Sidewalks

To gain a better understanding of the pedestrian challenges in the community, Mayor Kovarik put together a Blue Ribbon Commission to study walking and biking infrastructure. The commission was made up of active bikers, Go Gurnee Champions and local leaders who have put together a plan for how Gurnee can be better connected for pedestrians. By looking at the entire community and nearby parks, schools and existing trails, the commission recommended 30 projects that would improve the connectivity of the community. An example of recommended projects included adding a trail along Hunt Club Road from Washington Street to the Hunt Club Park Aquatic Center where there is currently only a paved shoulder.
