Meet Woodland's New Superintendent Robert Machak

Woodland School District 50 is pleased to announce that Dr. Robert Machak is our new Superintendent as of July 1, 2022. The Board of Education approved Dr. Machak for the position at the January 27, 2022 Monthly Governing Meeting.

Dr. Machak first joined the #LifeintheW team in July of 2020 as the Associate Superintendent of Education after spending 12 years as superintendent in PreK-8 elementary school districts in both Evergreen Park District 124 and Emmons School District 33 in Antioch. He replaces Dr. Lori Casey, who retired at the end of June.

Dr. Machak started at Woodland during uncertain times as school districts across the country were dealing with the COVID-19 health

crisis. With his dedication to educational equity, he was able to implement programs and supports for students both academically and socially. He quickly developed relationships in the community to secure donations for a weekly food drive and supported families by connecting them with resources for child care and other needed programs as families struggled with balancing work and remote learning. Working with the school nurses and health office staff, he helped implement Woodland's weekly SHIELD testing program and Lake County's Test to Stay program with the goal of keeping students in school. Dr. Machak also started a winter break assistance program and expanded Woodland's summer program to help students who needed additional support due to pandemic disruptions.

During his time at Woodland, he has also served as the District's McKinney-Vento liaison and Title IX coordinator to ensure that all of our students are being treated equitably regarding access to District programming and resources. This past year, he developed a partnership with the College of Lake County that resulted in the District offering a series of tuition-free Adult Education classes for the parents of students in our English as a Second Language (ESL) program. Most recently, he worked with the middle school administrative team to develop an academic intervention program called Core Academic Support that will allow all students in 6th and 7th grade to receive help in math and English language arts during the school day.

Throughout his 30-year career in education, Dr. Machak has shown great compassion for the students in his care and has a strong reputation for building positive relationships with District staff and community stakeholders. As an advocate of public education with a wide range of knowledge for curriculum, operations and business office functions, Dr. Machak is committed to helping all families feel connected to Woodland because there is something for everyone in #LifeintheW!

TRIN Team Assembled to Assist Woodland Families

Did you know that Woodland families speak more than 54 languages in the home? Parents have a right to access school related information in a language that they speak/understand.

Woodland provides interpretation (verbal) and translation (written) services to communicate critical information to families about their child's education and district programs. These services are often contracted through an external service provider, but Woodland has created a new TRIN



Team to provide Translation (TR) and Interpretation (IN) services beginning in the 2022-2023 school year.

Thanks to a large and diverse staff, Woodland has 22 staff members that have gone through an extensive language proficiency assessment, as well as ethics training to understand the responsibilities of a translator. TRIN Team members must also complete training on Special Education Terminology and Interpreter Etiquette before assisting District families. TRIN Team members speak Spanish, Russian, Chinese Mandarin, French and American Sign Language, with more languages on the way such as Tagalog, Bengali, Urdu and German, once training is complete. The team has been assembled from staff across the District including teachers, paraprofessionals, transportation staff, health staff, Operations & Facilities and guest teachers.

Woodland Parent Teacher Association (PTA):

The Woodland PTA is looking for parents, teachers, friends, neighbors and grandparents who will work together to support the Woodland learning community.

In the 2021-2022 school year, the PTA hosted events and fundraisers at both local businesses and here in our schools to raise money that directly benefits our students. The PTA donated some of the money raised to the annual food drive to help feed Woodland families, supplied hats and gloves to keep our students warm in the winter, purchased new playground equipment and books for the schools and provided exciting assemblies and cultural

Intermediate Teacher Named Woodland's Gurnee Teacher of the Year

Special Education teacher Joe Rejczyk has been named Woodland's Gurnee Teacher of the Year for 2022.

Joe Rejczyk began working at Woodland Intermediate in 1997, after spending one year teaching at a middle school in Beach Park. He was a Physical Education teacher for 24 years but felt a calling to work with Special Education students. In 2020, he completed the necessary requirements to become a Special Education Teacher and started the 2020-2021 school year in a structured classroom.

Rejczyk explained, "As a gym teacher, I noticed a need for our special education students to have a more fulfilling PE experience. I started a buddy program to invite general education students to help assist and interact with the adaptive PE classes. When I saw what a difference this made, I sought

out more opportunities to work with the special education students. I began subbing for special education teachers, and then I applied to be a paraprofessional during the Extended School Year program in the summer. I love that I was able to go on this journey with the students, and I am thankful for the wonderful support from my mentors and the paraprofessionals who support me everyday."

From the nomination forms submitted for Mr. Rejczyk, it is clear that he is student-focused and always ready to celebrate the daily successes and achievements of his students. He is also dedicated to communicating with parents and building relationships with his students and their families.

Woodland selects a school winner from each of the five schools in the District. From the list of five finalists, an overall winner is selected for recognition as Gurnee's Teacher of the Year.

Woodland appreciates the Village of Gurnee and the Henderson Foundation for providing the framework and tools to recognize Mr. Rejczyk and all of the educators that were nominated for this award.



Portrait of a Graduate



Gurnee School District 56 completed the development of a Portrait of a Graduate during the 2021-22 school year. This was a project that was started in March of 2020 and was delayed as a result of the pandemic. This tool has identified a set of competencies that each D56 graduate should develop prior to graduation. These competencies were created with input from the D56 community including students, parents and teachers as well as the teachers from Warren Township High School. Sorting through hundreds of responses, the D56 committee was able to categorize common skills under specific competencies. Each of the seven competencies is broken down by grade levels from kindergarten through eighth grade.

This information will be available to everyone through our District website at the start of the new school year. Visitors to the site will be able to click on any of the competencies noted in the image above and find out what it looks like to be a "Contributing Citizen" in kindergarten: Building/expanding on their thoughts; Understanding that mistakes are part of learning; Using a trial and error approach, sharing ideas and what it looks like in eighth grade; Helping others to make inferences and draw logical conclusions; Helping others to build on and make connections to thoughts and ideas: Leading others to develop innovative ideas; and Helping them to apply those ideas, to real-world problems, etc.

We are very excited about the completion of the project. The final product is an example of the excellent work the team put towards this goal. Our Portrait of a Graduate will lead us for years to come.

Create an ongoing plan for reviewing compensation and benefits as it relates to the retention and attraction of highly skilled candidates.


Visionary Leadership



Ashley Turkington Named Warren Township High School's Gurnee Teacher of the Year

"One of the greatest privileges in my life is to work with students who need more behavioral and emotional support, and I can be a cheerleader and supporter, as well as their teacher," Turkington said. "I believe that life can deal some real tough cards to certain students; if I can be even a glimmer of hope in their otherwise chaotic worlds, then I'm doing my job correctly. For that, I am truly fortunate. I genuinely believe that these students teach me just as much as I teach them."

Turkington says her role at Warren is to provide a safe environment in which students are provided the following: a smaller, structured setting, direct instruction of content, individualized learning opportunities and assisting and supporting students in the reduction in the number of credits that they need to recover. It is a joy to be able to provide a positive learning environment for personal success and student growth – both academic and social – as well as providing students with Executive Functioning Skills, including Emotional Control, Self-Monitoring and Organization in everyday emotional and academic tasks.

"Ashley always puts her students first and provides all the necessary supports for their success," said Dr. John Ahlgrim, retired Warren Township High School District 121 Superintendent. "She is creative and enthusiastic in her lessons and provides exceptional inspiration for her students and our entire WTHS community. We are proud to help recognize her as our Gurnee Teacher of the Year."

"Teachers at WTHS are among some of the greatest educators because of their heart, their inspiration, their dedication, and their drive to genuinely want to better every single student's life that they encounter. I have been blessed to work with these phenomenal colleagues and friends, and find myself constantly striving to be a better version of myself under their influence and because of their influence," said Turkington.

She holds a bachelor's degree from Northern Illinois University in Special Education and a master's degree in Curriculum and Instruction from Concordia University.

Voters Approve Referendum for Warren Township High School

On Tuesday, June 28, the referendum question on the primary election ballot regarding a possible 60-cent increase to the Warren Township High School District 121's limiting tax rate was passed.

The approved referendum will generate approximately \$13.25 million in additional revenue annually, with an estimated yearly tax impact of \$200 per year on \$100,000 of a home's fair market value—or \$16.67 per month.

As a result, the District will be able to preserve current opportunities for WTHS students, including:

- Maintaining the 8-period day needed to continue offering many Advanced Placement courses and ensure full participation in career and technical education classes at the Technology Campus.
- Reinstating the O'Plaine campus post-secondary counseling services.
- Continuing to offer band, drama, choir, and other student activities and clubs, including the immediate reinstatement of a band director position and the competitive marching band, to the extent possible.
- Continuing to offer athletic programming across all grade levels, including the immediate reinstatement of entry-level sports schedules, to the extent possible.
- Reducing student fees to levels comparable with other Lake County high school districts, including the reduction of our registration fees from the current \$545 per student to \$200 for next school year.

WTHS would like to thank our community members for the productive and thoughtful conversations over the past ten months. Through informational meetings and other engagement opportunities, we had the chance to hear a wide range of perspectives and answer questions. It is clear that we live in a community that invests in our schools and students.

"Our children are the leaders of tomorrow, and this investment in their education will have many benefits moving forward," said Paul Schulz, Board President. "I am glad that future Blue Devils will receive the same strong education and opportunities as those who preceded them. It will be great to preserve the academics, athletics, and clubs for future students."

This recognition is unique as it measures how schools challenge their students academically rather than measuring solely on student test scores.

This ranking puts WTHS in the top 13% of high schools nationally and in the top 9% of high schools in Illinois.



Our clerks work on a rotating schedule, including public desk time, as well as behind the scenes work of answering calls, preparing holds, bundling materials to send to other libraries and following up on lost, missing or damaged items.

Shelving staff work hard to replenish collections on shelf, filling hold requests or shifting materials to improve accessibility for patrons. Our shelvers assess materials when they come back to the library and make sure they are in good condition to check out to the next patron.

Our friendly security staff has a visible presence in the library with goals to ensure our surroundings are safe and accessible to everyone year-round. Security staff often help patrons easily access the library during their visit with library issued scooters or rolling baskets. They also assist with locating lost items or helping with donated materials from our generous patrons.

What exactly is 211 Lake County?

211 Lake County acts as a central access point to the health and human services of Lake County. 211 can help navigate and provide connections for mental health services, addiction support and rehabilitation, crisis counseling, supplemental food programs, shelter and affordable housing options, employment and education support, financial support, disaster information and relief and much more. United Way of Lake County contracts with Interface Children & Family Services—highly trained, certified professionals—as the contact center for 211 Lake County.



What are some examples of how 211 Lake County can help me?

- Your electricity was just turned off because you couldn't pay the bill. Call 2-1-1 to find out how to get help catching up on your payments.
- Your grandmother can't live alone any more. You wish you could take care of her, but you work all day. Call 2-1-1 to learn how to find a caring, safe place for her to live.
- Someone in your home has started hitting you. Use 211 to find a safe place to go right now and to make a plan for the future.
- Your teenager seems to have lost friends and spends too much time alone in his room. 211 can guide you to a mental health expert who can help you decide what to do next.
- You just got a new job but are not sure how to get there. 211 can send you to transportation resources that can help.

How can I use it?
