Bi-Weekly Leaf Collection Program

The Village offers an annual leaf collection program through its contract with Waste Management. Through this program, residents have the ability to dispose of leaves that accumulate in their yards during the fall season.

Included in the program is free unlimited weekly bagged leaf pickup and bi-weekly leaf vacuum service.

The 2021 Leaf Collection Program will begin on Monday, October 18th and continue for eight weeks until Friday, December 10th. During this time, residents may put out unlimited bags of leaves without stickers every week.

Leaf vacuum service for leaves raked to the curb line will be completed bi-weekly for residents depending on their orientation to I-94. Residents east of I-94 will receive leaf vacuum service on odd weeks, and residents west of I-94 will receive leaf vacuum service on even weeks. Residents must have leaves to the curb by 6:00 a.m. Monday of their pickup week to ensure collection. The move to bi-weekly service is being done to provide residents a more reliable pickup schedule and allows Waste Management to focus on half of the community each week for a more complete cleanup.

Leaf collection does not necessarily take place on the same day as your regular garbage pick-up. A leaf collection map has been posted to the Village's website for your reference: www.gurnee.il.us/residents/recycling/leaf-collection.



Seasonal Reminders

Landscape Waste Collection Ends Nov. 26th

Subscription and stickered landscape waste collection will conclude for the year the week of Monday, November 22nd - Friday, November 29th. Landscape waste pickup takes place on the same day as your regular trash/recycling collection. Any landscape waste placed at the curb after this week will not be picked up. Compost Your Pumpkins - Nov. 6th

The Village will be hosting a pumpkin composting event in coordination with SWALCO and SCARCE. The event will take place on Saturday, November 6th from 9:00 a.m. - noon at Gurnee Village Hall (325 N. O'Plaine Road). The event will also take any other organics, including gourds or hay bales. Please remove all candles before composting your pumpkins. All material donated is used to create compost and diverts organics from the landfills.

Change Your Clock and Your Battery

Daylight Savings ends on Sunday, November 7th. Don't forget to turn your clocks back an hour before bed on Saturday, November 6th. As this date approaches, the Village of Gurnee Fire Department would like to remind all residents to change the batteries in their smoke alarms when they turn their clocks back one hour. Changing the batteries in your smoke alarm is a simple task that can save lives.

In the United States, smoke alarms are present in 96% of American homes, but 20% do not work because of worn or missing batteries, preventing families from achieving the full potential of increased fire safety from smoke alarms. If a fire occurs, working smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in a home fire nearly in half by providing an early warning and extra critical seconds to escape. Approximately 84% of fire deaths occur in homes where smoke alarms are not working.

Village Launches Citizen Request Management Portal - GovQA

The Village of Gurnee is pleased to launch our new citizen request management software and mobile app, powered by GovQA. The request management tool allows residents and businesses to request services or records from the Village via our website, mobile app, or even by calling or visiting the Village. Residents can use the GovQA platform to report a street light outage, request a vacation home watch or submit many other service requests to the Village.

Mayor Tom Hood stated, "The new GovQA software will allow residents the ability to take a photo of graffiti or another requested service, send it to the correct department and immediately create a work order to allow the resident to track the progress. All of this can be done through a mobile app, and it allows better two-way communication with residents and the Village."

The GovQA platform also contains frequently asked questions that can help answer common questions 24/7, to assist in getting answers to your questions quickly.

The GovQA mobile app is available for download on Android and iPhone. Residents can find the app by searching "Gurnee Citizen Portal" in the Google Play or Apple Store. Residents can also send requests through the Village website at www.gurnee.il.us.

Residents who do not use mobile apps or online services are always welcome to call the Village at 847-599-7500 or stop by Village Hall (325 N O'Plaine Road) to submit a request in person.

Is Your Furnace Ready For Winter?

Now that the weather is getting a bit cooler, do you know if your furnace is ready for winter? You do not want to get caught on a cold day with no heat! Here are some quick tips to make sure you are ready to go when that thermometer dips:

- 1. Make sure the furnace is running before it's too cold. Switch your system from cooling to heating. Set the thermostat a couple of degrees higher than the current room temperature and listen to make sure you can hear the heat kick on.
- 2. Change your air filters. Make sure you have a good routine to change your air filters every few months. Or, if you have a permanent electrostatic filter, make sure it is clean. Cleaning or replacing air filters regularly prolongs the life of your HVAC system. This is a reminder to change the filter on your humidifier too, if you have one.
- 3. Now may be a great time to schedule a check-up for your system, especially if you have not had it checked in a while. Trained professionals will check the heat exchanger to make sure that it is clean and there are no cracks, verify the blower motor is working properly, test the igniter switch and verify other manufacturer specifications for your unit.
- 4. Test or replace your carbon monoxide detectors.
- 5. If your furnace needs to be replaced, please remember that a building permit is required.

Don't delay - make sure you're safe and will be warm this winter!

Leaf Burning Prohibited


As a friendly reminder, the Village prohibits burning landscape waste. This ban includes leaf burning, the burning of brush, landscape waste or construction materials and large bonfires.

The Village does allow residents to create small, outdoor wood burning fires. The ordinance permits residents to use portable outdoor fire pits and build small wood burning campfires.

Is Your Mailbox Ready for Winter?

With the winter quickly approaching, residents are reminded that mailboxes must be properly positioned. In October, plow trucks will drive through snow routes, making note of right-of-way hazards and improperly placed, leaning or damaged mailboxes. Residents with mailboxes having these issues will be sent a letter asking for their cooperation in bringing the mailbox into compliance with USPS standards.

Residents who receive a letter and fail to repair the mailbox will not be eligible for reimbursement of damage caused by snow and ice control operations. If you have questions regarding your mailbox placement, please contact Public Works at (847) 599-6800.

Village Update

Fire Station 3



The Village of Gurnee and Warren-Waukegan Fire Protection District (WWFPD) are proud to announce the opening of Fire Station 3 at 5330 Manchester Drive, Gurnee, IL 60031. At 14,452 square feet, the new fire station will staff five firefighter/paramedics and house two ambulances and one ladder truck. The new fire station includes highly efficient technology and materials, reducing the energy and carbon footprint of the new building.

Following a competitive selection process, FGM Architects was selected to design the station, and Camosy Construction was selected as the construction manager. In 2019, the original bid for the project came in at approximately \$6.3M. Fire Station 3 was included in the Fiscal Year 2020/2021 Capital budget; however, it was one of the expenditures delayed in April 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Due to construction and supply trends around June 2020, Camosy Construction suggested the Village seek bids for construction. Following advisement, bids came in at \$5.8M. Despite the unprecedented impact of COVID-19 on all aspects of the economy and daily life, the construction of Station 3 was not affected. The building is opening on time and on budget.
