MAYOR'S MESSAGE

Dear Residents.

As winter wanes and we enter into spring, Alexander Pope's words come to mind: "Hope springs eternal". It seems that as we emerge from winter our hope of new things is reflected in nature and in our mounting expectation of what lies ahead. We in the Village of Gurnee, known as the "Community of Opportunity", harbor this same hope and expectation as we look ahead to the coming months. We're expanding the Sounds of Summer offerings held at Viking Park and will aslo continue to enjoy Gurnee Days in August. In the early fall, the Gurnee Police, Fire and Public Works will be at a park near you to allow an up-close and personal look into their operations. We are also in the process of planning a fall Oktoberfest-like event. The Village and its partners are working to expand community events for Gurnee residents so that we can continue to enjoy each other's company.

Spring brings a very practical reality for us at the Village. Our finances operate on a fiscal year that begins on May 1, 2023. As a result, the work on this year's budget began last fall. With my collaboration, Pat Muetz, the Village Administrator, and Brian Gosnell, the Finance Director, lead the charge in laying the groundwork for a successful budget. In keeping with my desire to pull back the curtain on Village operations, the next paragraphs are dedicated to describing the budget process and our current financial condition. I hope you find it informative and helpful.

Budget construction starts at the department level, where each department-fire, police, public works, community development and administration—works with its departmental leaders to determine the needs in personnel, equipment, inventory, facilities and scheduled projects for the upcoming fiscal year. Each department head and management team makes a presentation to the Village Administrator and Finance Director who then leads a healthy discussion over the needs, outcomes and alternatives to determine cuts and investments. The Finance Director conservatively estimates revenues for the coming year and balances the budget.

The staff's budget rough draft is then presented to the trustees two at a time for input. Each trustee's input is considered in making changes to the budget. The next draft of the budget is presented in a series of budget hearings. Each department head presents their budget both to the trustees and to me at a public meeting. Further revisions are made before the budget is finally presented at a public hearing to the trustees for a vote; if a majority approves the budget, it is then put in place on May 1, 2023. The draft and final budgets are available online prior to the workshop and public hearing.

Because we rely on very elastic revenue sources, the Village maintains a strong reserve of more than 30 million dollars, which is 70 percent of budgeted expenditures. All this has been done while maintaining a AAA bond rating since 2014, and the Village is nearly debt free, as we have recently paid off the debt for Fire Station 3.

I am thankful for the Village's strong financial position, but as is true of anything these days, change can quickly occur. A constant monitoring and conservative approach is necessary to maintain the strong Village services that we all enjoy.

As always, I am available at my regularly scheduled coffees, by telephone, via e-mail or through in person visits. Please introduce yourself and let me know of any questions, concerns or things you enjoy in the Village.

I pray that this year we enjoy all the good things God has gifted us; that we appreciate those He has placed in our lives; and that despite any adversity we may face, we remember that "hope springs eternal".

This award recognizes businesses in our community that have taken significant steps to reduce their environmental impact and promote sustainability. Fastlane Lubemasters of 6280 Grand Ave. has demonstrated its commitment to environmental sustainability by implementing many environmentally friendly practices including using a waste oil furnace to heat service bays, procuring Mobil 1 products in 55 gallon barrels to avoid generating plastic waste and developing low speed electric vehicles for customer transport, in addition to many others. Fastlane Lubemasters is an excellent example of the kind of responsible business practices that the Village encourages in our community.





VILLAGE BOARD APPROVES EXPANSION OF SMALL BUSINESS CAPITAL **INVESTMENT GRANT PROGRAM**

On February 20th, the Village Board voted to approve the expansion of the Small Business Capital Investment Grant Program. The purpose of this program aims to assist eligible small business owners in making capital investments that they may not have been able to accomplish otherwise. To date, 36 small businesses have successfully obtained \$318,691 in grant funding from the Village that when combined with the businesses' investments resulted in a community investment of \$2,070,922; this includes 16 restaurants, 19 retail businesses and one amusement business. Not only will the expansion allow for greater funding opportunities, it also allows

previous awardees with multiple projects on the horizon to reapply for grant funding. As continual business growth is important, the retention and reinvestment into the small business community is vital to the Village of Gurnee. SPRING FLOODING: PROTECTING YOUR HOME

Springtime is often associated with warmer weather and the start of new growth, but it also brings the risk of flooding. With heavy rains and melting snow, the increased runoff can lead to rising water levels in rivers and streams, especially in areas near the Des Plaines River (with 235 sq. miles of drainage upstream) as well as contribute to localized flooding throughout the community. To help protect your home and family from the dangers of spring flooding, it's important to take a few simple proactive measures.

Know Your Flood Risk: Before the flood season begins, contact the Village with any questions or concerns that you may have at 847-599-7550. Professional staff are available to assist property owners with drainage or flooding problems, flood map interpretation, flood insurance requirements, building protection guidance, and will also be available to visit a site upon requirements.

Keep Your Drainage System Clear: Make sure storm sewers, ditches ar sump pump and make sure it is in good working condition. To report de the Gurnee Public Works Department at 847-599-6800. Please note the violators will be fined. If you see this occurring, please contact the Gurn

Protect Your Property: If you are a property owner in the floodplain, y floodplain can also purchase a policy to protect their assets. Anyone who business is encouraged to take pictures of the area during the event arkeeps on file historical information for residents such as assessment d

Prepare a Flood Emergency Kit: Keep a supply of emergency essentials flashlights in a waterproof container.

Create a Flood Action Plan: Make a plan with your family for what to ogo and determine the best escape routes.

Stay Informed: During a flood event, stay informed by monitoring local news and weather reports. Follow any evacuation orders if issued and avoid driving through flooded areas.

Parkway Tree Planting Program

As part of the Village's ongoing environmental effort and to increase the number of trees in town, the Village will share the cost of about 60 new parkway trees. The Village will contribute 50% of the cost of the trees with residents providing the remaining \$175.00. Participation in the program is strictly voluntary and is limited to owner-occupied homes. Trees will be planted in May (as weather permits) and our certified arborist will monitor the health of the tree during the initial growing season.

Each new parkway tree must be placed midway between the curb (or pavement edge) and the sidewalk (or 7' from the pavement for locations without a sidewalk), at least 30' from any other parkway tree, at least 10' from a driveway and at least 45' from an intersection. Every attempt will be made to locate the tree as indicated on the order form; however, locations will be reviewed for suitability and to avoid utility conflicts. Please make your drawing as clear as possible, noting the location of your house, curb, sidewalk, driveways, intersections, existing trees, fire hydrants or any other objects in the area.

	Triumph Hybrid Elm - 2½" caliper (55' tall x 50' wide at maturity) fast growing tree with shiny dark green leaves turning a nice yellow in fall. Bred for its resistance to Dutch Elm Disease and shows many of the desirable traits of the American Elm.
	Eastern Redbud - $2\frac{1}{2}$ " caliper (20'-30' tall x 20'-30' wide at maturity) native ornamental tree with a rounded canopy, heart shaped leaves and distinct pink-purple bloom in early spring.

This summer, the Village's contractor will be carrying out the annual Sidewalk Replacement Program in the general area of Grand Ave. south to Washington St. and from Hunt Club Rd. west to Almond Rd./Vineyard Dr. Residents in this area that are planning on having driveway work completed can check with Public Works to see if they will be impacted by this project. If so, residents may want to postpone their driveway work until after the sidewalk program is completed. Additionally, the removal and reinstallation of brick pavers or decorative bricks adjacent to sidewalk squares are the responsibility of the homeowner.
