MAYOR'S MESSAGE

Dear Residents,

I trust "Spring is just around the corner," even as the plow trucks thunder down my street. Times like these remind me of all that the Gurnee Public Works does for us: providing water to our homes, clearing roads of snow, maintaining Village-owned infrastructure and much, much more.

As Mayor, I have been given a unique opportunity to empower those around me. As one example, I have challenged Village staff to dream and think outside the box—a practice that is now part of our yearly budget planning process. This infuses future decisions with innovation and creativity, and I have greatly enjoyed seeing this develop with true teamwork.

An example of innovation was presented at a recent Village Board meeting by Deputy Chief Jeremy Gaughan. He proposed that the Village hire criminal justice students from the College of Lake County to provide support to internal public safety operations as Gurnee transitions to the new state-of-the-art LakeComm Consolidated Dispatch Center. This would allow the Police Department to couple administrative tasks with law enforcement functions to evaluate these student employees' capacity to serve as future police officers, which is a critical hiring need. This proposed program is one-of-a-kind and believed to be the only one in the country.

Additionally, I have formed a number of groups and initiatives that empower residents to excel in a variety of areas. A few of those groups are the Environmental Sustainability Committee, the Veterans Blue Ribbon Commission, the Gurnee Youth Leadership Initiative, the Gurnee Teacher of the Year Awards and most recently the Arts Commission and the Care Commission. The members are given the opportunity to steer the direction of the group while gathering with like-minded people in order to make the difference that our community needs.

The Gurnee Teacher of the Year Awards are a prime example of where my original vision has been greatly expanded by those participating. The Superintendents from each school district took the Gurnee Teacher of the Year Award and utilized it in their district to show all of the teachers what administration believes to be an excellent teacher and then recommends that teacher to be honored by the Village.

Most recently, the commission that I have a great deal of excitement about is the Arts Commission. I am looking to encourage the arts to flourish in Gurnee including: music, theater, dance, painting and more. Please contact Matt Trujillo, the Community Engagement Coordinator, for more information. Also, feel free to accept this as an invitation to participate in any one of these initiatives or groups, or contact me if you have an idea for one that you would like to start.

Being Mayor is a multifaceted role that continually presents unique opportunities for me to connect and engage residents in enhancing our community life. I will be highlighting those many different aspects of the position of Mayor in my next "From the Mayor's Desk" message posted on Facebook and Instagram.

I pray that this year we enjoy all that God has gifted us and to especially appreciate those that He has placed in our lives.



SPRING FLOODING: PROTECTING YOUR HOME

Springtime is often associated with warmer weather and the start of new growth, but it also brings the risk of flooding. With heavy rains and melting snow, the increased runoff can lead to rising water levels in rivers and streams, especially in areas near the Des Plaines River (with 235 sq. miles of drainage upstream) as well as contribute to localized flooding throughout the community. To help protect your home and family from the dangers of spring flooding, it's important to take a few simple proactive measures.

Know Your Flood Risk: Before the flood season begins, contact the Village with any questions or concerns that you may have at 847-599-7550. Professional staff are available to assist property owners with drainage or flooding problems, flood map interpretation, flood insurance requirements, building protection guidance and staff are available to visit a site upon request.





debris. Also check your home's sump pump and make sure it is in good working condition. To report debris in any of the Village's waterways, please contact the Gurnee Public Works Department at 847-599-6800. Please note that it is illegal to dump materials into a waterway and violators will be fined. If you see this occurring, please contact the Gurnee Police Department at 847-599-7000.

Protect Your Property: If you are a property owner in the floodplain, you potentially need flood insurance. Renters in the floodplain can also purchase a policy to protect their assets. Anyone who experiences flooding or seepage into their home or business is encouraged to take pictures of the area during the event and contact the Village for inspection. In addition, the Village keeps on file historical information for residents such as assessment data, flood maps and photos.

Prepare a Flood Emergency Kit: Keep a supply of emergency essentials on hand, including water, food, first-aid supplies and flashlights in a waterproof container.

Create a Flood Action Plan: Make a plan with your family for what to do in case of a flood emergency. Designate a safe place to go and determine the best escape routes.

Stay Informed: During a flood event, stay informed by monitoring local news and weather reports. Follow any evacuation orders if issued and avoid driving through flooded areas.

PARKWAY TREE PLANTING PROGRAM

As part of the Village's ongoing environmental efforts and to increase the number of trees in town, the Village will share the cost of about 60 new parkway trees. The Village will contribute 50% of the cost of the trees with residents providing the remaining \$175. Participation in the program is voluntary and is limited to owner-occupied homes. Trees will be planted in May (as weather permits) and our certified arborist will monitor the health of the tree during the initial growing season.

Each new parkway tree must be placed midway between the curb (or pavement edge) and the sidewalk (or 7' from the pavement for locations without a sidewalk), at least 30' from any other parkway tree, at least 10' from a driveway and at least 45' from an intersection. Every attempt will be made to locate the tree as indicated on the order form, however locations will be reviewed for suitability and to avoid utility conflicts. Please make your drawing as clear as possible, noting the location of your house, curb, sidewalk, driveways, intersections, existing trees, fire hydrants or any other objects in the area.

PROPOSED BUDGET NOW AVAILABLE AND BUDGET WORKSHOP SET FOR MARCH 3

The Village of Gurnee is committed to transparency and fiscal accountability in managing public resources. The Proposed Annual Budget for the upcoming 2025 - 2026 fiscal year is now available for public viewing at <u>www.gurnee.il.us/budget</u>. Residents are encouraged to view the budget and provide any feedback. A budget workshop on the Proposed Annual Budget will take place on March 3 at 5:30pm at the Gurnee Village Hall located at 325 N. O'Plaine Rd. The Village Board will then consider the budget for formal approval on April 7.

FREE UNLIMITED YARD WASTE COLLECTION TAKING PLACE THE WEEKS OF APRIL 7 AND APRIL 14

For the weeks beginning Monday, April 7 and April 14, LRS will be conducting free and unlimited containerized landscape waste collection throughout the Village for those who do not pay a homeowners association (HOA) for waste collection services. Landscape waste must be placed at the curb or the edge of the road by 6am on your regular pick-up day and must be containerized in one of the following ways:

- Kraft-type paper bag not to exceed 45 lbs.
- Rigid cans not to exceed 32-gallons.
- Bundles of brush not to exceed 2 feet in diameter by 4 feet long and weighing no more than 60 pounds with no individual branch being greater than 3 inches in diameter. Must be bundled and tied with twine or string in distinct piles.

Failure to have materials out by 6am on your pick up day will result in the waste not being collected. As a result, residents will have to wait until the next week or when the annual collection program begins.

SPRING TIME FIRE SAFETY

As longer days and warmer weather nears, the Gurnee Fire Department offers 5 key tips to safely tackle spring cleaning and fire safety:

- Change your smoke alarm and carbon monoxide batteries.
- Clean your dryer duct annually/twice a year for families with heavier use.
- Keep grills at least 3 feet from a structure and inspect for grease buildup, rust and cracked hoses.
- Properly store gasoline in a tightly sealed and approved container in a detached garage or outdoor shed.
- Have a home fire escape plan ready.

SIDEWALK REPLACEMENT PROGRAM TAKING PLACE IN NORTH-CENTRAL GURNEE

This summer, the Village's contractor will be carrying out the annual Sidewalk Replacement Program for sidewalks that meet the criteria for replacement in the general area east of I-94 from Washington St. north along Rt. 21 to the Village's northern limits. Residents in this area who are planning to have driveway work completed can check with Public Works to see if they will be impacted by this project. If so, residents may want to postpone their driveway work until after the sidewalk program is completed. Additionally, the removal and reinstallation of brick pavers or decorative bricks adjacent to sidewalk squares are the responsibility of the homeowner. Residents will be notified via door tag 48 hours in advance of any work commencing. If you have any questions or concerns, please call the Public Works Department at 847-599-6800.
