MAYOR'S MESSAGE

Dear Residents:

We are heading into winter with the hope that it will be a mild one. All is well on the Village front as residents and businesses continue to amaze me with a generous willingness to volunteer and to contribute to the vibrant community fabric for which Gurnee is well-known. I hope all is well with you.

The Gurnee Chamber of Commerce Mayor's luncheon occurred last month at Great Wolf Lodge with more than 140 people in attendance, representing a wide range of businesses in town. It was rewarding to network with various business leaders and hear many stories of successful perseverance through these recently difficult times. Additionally, Yash Sharma of the Gurnee Youth Leadership Initiative spoke about the group's goals and initiatives and introduced the young leaders to the Gurnee Business Community.

Furthermore, Village staff leaders and I delivered a number of presentations to update business leaders on local happenings. The Village Board and I are making an effort to communicate to all residents the details of how the Village works. The first item on the list is to describe how a new business comes to the Village of Gurnee.

First, a business' decision to come to town is the independent choice of both the business and the owner of the proposed location. The Village has developed a comprehensive plan that provides development guidance to businesses and landowners, along with specific ordinances that require following a certain set of standards that ensure quality development in the Village. The Village takes an active role in this process.

The Village trustees and I often hear suggestions on the types of businesses that residents would like to see in the Village. Based on this feedback and staff's review of current businesses in town, staff actively pursues specific businesses that we would like to locate in the Village. The lead of that charge is the Economic Development Director Ellen Dean. She has many years of experience and many contacts, which she matches with what the Village of Gurnee has to offer. Members of Village staff then work at investigating whether a specific business is a good fit for the Village. As you might guess not all businesses decide to locate in Gurnee, even though we ask.

For example, recently a well-known restaurant, Cooper's Hawk, opened on the westend of Grand Avenue in the Village. The process of attracting Cooper's Hawk was intentional and began more than two years ago at a retail tradeshow that the Village attended. Based on that initial contact, Cooper's Hawk began looking at a number of sites in the Village. Many sites were found to not be a good fit for Cooper's Hawk. The Village learned the needs and wants of Cooper's Hawk through this process. Because we were in competition with many other villages to attract a high-end restaurant, we developed a competitive incentive package, one that still allowed for strong return on investment. In other words, shared tax between the Village and Cooper's Hawk and any outright infrastructure contributions made by the Village would be repaid through revenues in less than five years. Eventually, an agreement was reached as the College of Lake County purchased the Lowe's building and then sold an outlot to Cooper's Hawk, a win for all involved.

The Village endeavors to encourage the best development that generates the revenue needed to maintain excellent Village services while not contributing to the resident's real estate tax bill. All of this is done while offering the very best quality of life for Village residents. As you might imagine with a Village of nearly 31,000 residents, more than 1,200 businesses and 23 million visitors, this is a very difficult balancing act.

I look forward to providing a detailed description of Village activities in future communications. As always, I look forward to seeing you around the Village and welcome your questions and comments.

VILLAGE BOARD APPROVES 2023 -2026 STRATEGIC PLAN

Last month, the Village Board approved the 2023 - 2026 Strategic Plan. The planning efforts began in early 2022 with a review of the Village consisting of a community survey, an internal stakeholder survey, six focus groups, Board of Trustee interviews and a Strength, Weaknesses, Opportunities & Threats (SWOT) analysis. In May, the Village's leadership team held a full day strategic planning session, which concluded with the team identifying the following 6 Key Strategic Priorities: Fiscal Sustainability; Well-Maintained Infrastructure; Effective Communication; a Stable, Well-Trained Workforce; a Safe Community; and Lifestyle Vitality. On October 27th, Mayor Tom Hood, in partnership with the Village of Gurnee Chamber of Commerce, held the Annual Mayor's Business Luncheon at Great Wolf Lodge. Mayor Hood, Chamber of Commerce Past Chairman Nick Phillips, as well as Village staff presented for local business leaders. The presentations provided them with information regarding the Village's recent accomplishments and upcoming initiatives.

Also the Best of Gurnee Awards were presented to Loved Twice Thrift Boutique who won the "Bringing Me Home" Award and D. Wells Automotive who won the "Paying it Forward" Award. The Village of Gurnee is extremely proud of these businesses and all that they contribute not only to the local economy, but to benefit the Gurnee Community.





GURNEE POLICE DEPARTMENT LEVERAGES FLOCK SAFETY CAMERAS

The Gurnee Police Department has partnered with Gurnee Mills to enhance security measures at the area's largest shopping center. Increasing safety for shoppers and employees is a top priority, prompting Gurnee Mills to add the Flock Safety Automated License Plate Reader (ALPR) System. Since its installation two months ago, Gurnee Police have made seven arrests and recovered four stolen vehicles. The cameras proactively prevent crime by sending a real-time alert to law enforcement when a stolen car or known wanted suspect from a state or national crime database

enters the property. The system can also send alerts if a vehicle associated with a missing person in an AMBER or Silver Alert is detected. The ALPR System is just one example of how other Gurnee businesses and neighborhood HOAs can join the Community Partnership for Safety program. The local program encourages Gurnee businesses and residents to work together to reduce crime and maintain a safe community. Those interested in getting Flock Safety cameras for their business or neighborhood are encouraged to contact the Gurnee Police Department.


Bring the family to celebrate the holiday season on Thursday, December 8th!

SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENTS AND SEASONAL REMINDERS

GURNEE'S SNOW AND ICE CONTROL



Winter is here and the Village is ready to provide safe and clear streets. To help achieve our goal, please keep in mind the following:

PRIORITY PLOWING AND SALTING

During snow/icing events, Public Works crews focus on major streets (i.e. Almond, First, Lawson, and Dada) first to provide access for emergency vehicles and heavier traffic, then begin working on all other streets with dead ends being last. Crews will continue this process for the duration of the storm and come back to clean up side streets after the snowfall has ended. Gurnee only plows municipality-owned streets, which include most residential streets, Almond Rd. between Grand & Washington, Tri-State Pkwy., and Dada Dr. The following streets are plowed by the Illinois Department of Transportation (847-244-0034): Grand Ave., Milwaukee Ave., Rte.

120, Rte. 45, and Rte. 41. Hunt Club Rd., Washington St., O'Plaine Rd., Greenleaf Ave. (south of Washington), Dilleys Rd. (north of Rte. 132), Gages Lake Rd., Delany Rd. (north of Rte. 41), Sunset Ave. and Stearns School Rd. are plowed by Lake County (847-377-7400).

YOUR ROLE IN CLEARING SNOW

Snow removal equipment is designed to push snow onto the rightof-way which may result in snow being pushed onto driveways, mailboxes, sidewalks and hydrants. Residents and businesses are encouraged to clear:

Driveway aprons, sidewalks and mailboxes – Place the snow onto your property or the adjacent parkway.

Right-of-Way Items – Please remove portable basketball hoops, benches and decor from the street right-of-way.

Hydrants – Clear the snow and ice three feet around all sides of hydrants to provide access. This simple step could save lives.

Keep in mind that shoveling, blowing or plowing snow into the street creates hazardous driving conditions, negates the effort of our snowplowing operations and is prohibited by law.

WINTER WEATHER PARKING RESTRICTIONS

When it starts to snow, park your vehicle off of the street. This prevents the car from being plowed in or from receiving a ticket/being towed.

Please remember to drive cautiously and yield to snow removal equipment and emergency vehicles.

Christmas Tree Pick Up Begins January 5

Waste Management will collect Christmas trees on the following dates:

- Thursday, January 5
- Wednesday, January 18
- Wednesday, January 11
- Wednesday, January 25

In order for a tree to be collected, it must be placed at the curb or the edge of the street by 7am on the pick-up day. All lights and decorations must be removed. Failure to remove decorations or placing the tree in a plastic bag will result in the tree not being collected that week and, consequently, the resident will have to wait until the following week.

Trees placed out after 7am on January 25 will not be collected.



HOLIDAY REMINDER: WASTE COLLECTION AND OFFICE CLOSURE

Due to the Christmas Holiday and New Year's Day, garbage and recycling collection will be delayed by one day for the weeks beginning December 26th and January 2nd, 2023. Additionally, Village Offices will be closed on December 23rd (Christmas Eve Observed), December 26th (Christmas Day Observed) and January 2nd (New Year's Day Observed).

WINTER HOME MAINTENANCE TIPS

Winter is on its way! It is important to protect the interior and exterior of your property from the cold weather. The following tips can help prepare your home for the winter season.

- 1. Protect Pipes Maintain a consistent temperature of at least 60°F in all areas of your home and properly seal all possible entry points from outdoor air to prevent freezing of water pipes.
- 2. Furnace Maintenance Have an HVAC professional test and service your furnace annually to ensure all components are functioning properly.
- 3. Fireplace Maintenance Before using your fireplace for the first time this season, thoroughly clean it by removing soot and debris from the firebox and chimney.

If your fireplace needs maintenance and/or repair, consult with a chimney sweeper or fireplace service technician.
