

MAYOR'S MESSAGE

Dear Residents.

The holidays are upon us, and will be gone before we know it. As I have grown older, I have found how time goes by so fast and how much I want to slow down and enjoy those around me, not to be in such a rush to the next thing. Hopefully, you will have the opportunity to spend quality time with those that you love as well.

There are a couple of matters that I would like to address in this issue. The first is my desire to be more intentional in how we honor and assist those that have served in the armed services. I have formed the Gurnee Veterans Blue Ribbon Commission that will explore how we can best recognize and help our veterans. The sobering data surrounding the state of our veterans' mental health compels us to be more proactive as more than 20 veterans a day commit suicide in the United States. The Commission will initiate a study of the community and make recommendations to the Village Board. The Commission will be headed by Jim Huisel, a long-standing member of the Gurnee American Legion, and be joined by other veterans and family members.

Another matter that has weighed on me for years as a homeowner in the Village, and now as Mayor, is our high property taxes. Gurnee has a relatively low tax rate compared to other villages and cities in Lake County. That, however, does not mean that our property taxes are reasonable. The primary driver behind our high property taxes is that schools are largely funded through them. More than 80 percent of the property taxes collected fund the public school system. Even though Gurnee schools spend this money well, a portion of that support needs to come from other sources. With ever-rising costs making home-ownership increasingly difficult, the tax load on the homeowner must be lightened.

I am proud that for more than 20 years, the Village of Gurnee has not added to the burden of your property tax bill; this is no small thing. However, that is not enough. It is time to seriously address the increasing tax burden. To do this, I have formed a task force that will examine, research and execute the necessary steps to reduce our property tax bills. This task force is made up of Sandy Hart, Lake County Board Chair; Adrienne Johnson, Illinois State Senator; Joyce Mason, Illinois State Representative; Charlie Mullin, Warren Township Assessor; Art Stevens, a retired consultant; and me. The answer is not to reduce the funding to our schools; rather, it is to ensure that residents are fully capitalizing on available property tax exemptions and to confirm fair and proper tax rates according to current tax law. Additionally, the task force will examine each component of the tax bill to identify alternate ways to raise funds for schools and other entities. More information on this will be coming in the months ahead.

Finances are important but so is enjoying the holiday season in which we have so many events happening including the Turkey Trot on Thanksgiving, the Canadian Pacific Kansas City Holiday Train on December 3rd, and Holiday Lights on December 7th in Welton Plaza--just to name a few. The details of these events and more are included in this issue of Keeping Posted. Please come out and enjoy your family, friends and neighbors at these events. As I am fond of saying, "more, more, more." as we as a Village look to expand the events and experiences that are available to our residents.

I pray that this year we enjoy all that God has gifted us and to especially appreciate those that He has placed in our lives. May you have a Happy Thanksgiving, Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

ElderCare Lake County Services

Transportation to Medical Appointments

At a typical visit to provide transportation, an ElderCARE volunteer escorts seniors to their vehicle, takes them to their medical appointment and returns them back home. ElderCARE also assists with drop-off and pick-up from lengthy appointments such as dialysis. Please provide at least 10 days notice when requesting. One ride per week may be scheduled.

Grocery Shopping

Do you or a senior that you know need assistance getting groceries? Access to healthy food is important. Through ElderCARE grocery shopping service, volunteers take the grocery list and make the trip to the store. Seniors pay for the groceries and the service is free.

Living alone can be challenging, especially when it's tough to get out and interact with others. ElderCARE's friendly visits services provide an opportunity for seniors to develop lasting friendships by phone or over a cup of tea or a game.

Warren Township Senior Services

The Warren Township Center offers a wide variety of senior activities such as luncheons, fitness classes and various games. Also, for anyone looking for support as they go through any life change, support group meets Wednesdays from 1:30 p.m. to 3:00 p.m.

Social and Financial Services

The Senior Center has a Social Service staff ready to assist residents. Information and help can be provided in applying for federal, state and local programs including Medicare and social security information and assistance. Their trained Senior Health Insurance Program (SHIP) counselors are available by appointment to provide information and assistance navigating the Medicare and Social Security process and what seniors need to know to avoid penalties as well as one-on-one assistance with Enrollment Advantage Plans Supplements/Medigap, Medicare Savings Program, Prescription Drug Plans/Part D Insurance Claims.

Utility and Financial Assistance Programs

Information, screening and assistance is provided for applying for and maintaining eligibility for different programs such as: LIHEAP (Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program), a federal/state program for those eligible to receive yearly credit on gas and electric bills; Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)/Food; Medicaid; and Prescription Drug Assistance.

They also have additional information on housing, legal services, elder abuse, counseling services, transportation, caregiving resources, home services, repairs & improvements and senior Health Insurance Program (SHIP). SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENTS AND SEASONAL REMINDERS

GURNEE'S SNOW AND ICE CONTROL



With the onset of the winter season, the Gurnee Public Works Department would like to offer the following information to keep in mind as snow plowing operations begin.

Village plowing operations commence when the snow begins to accumulate and temperatures indicate that no melting will occur. The Village plows only municipally-owned streets. The Village of Gurnee is intersected by a number of State of Illinois and Lake County arterial highways which are not maintained/plowed by the Village. Routes 132, 120, 45, 41 and 21 are plowed and maintained by the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT). Hunt Club, Washington, O'Plaine, Greenleaf (south of Washington), Dilley's (north of Rt. 132),

Gages Lake, Delany (north of Rt. 41), Sunset and Stearns School are plowed and maintained by the Lake County Division of Transportation (LCDOT).

The following tips help ensure snow and ice control operations proceed smoothly:

- 1. When clearing sidewalks and driveways, do not shovel, blow or plow snow onto the roadway.
- 2. When it starts to snow, park your vehicle off of the street.
- 3. Please try to clear the snow around fire hydrants. This simple step could save precious time during an emergency.
- 4. Please remove portable basketball hoops, benches and decor from the street right-of-way. The Village is not responsible for damage to these items resulting from our snow removal operations.
- 5. To minimize snow deposits at the end of your driveway, try not to create large piles of snow in the parkway on the upstream side. While it's frustrating to shovel your driveway only to have the plow come by and push snow back at the base, it is not feasible to plow the street so that your driveway remains completely "snow free." Roadway design, the type of equipment that is utilized and the severity of snow events all factor into the size of the windrow left in the plow's wake.

CHRISTMAS TREE PICK UP BEGINS THURSDAY, JANUARY 4

Waste Management will collect Christmas trees on the following dates:

- Thursday, January 4
- Wednesday, January 10
- Wednesday, January 17

- Wednesday, January 24
- Wednesday, January 31

In order for a tree to be collected, it must be placed at the curb or the edge of the street by 7:00am on the pick-up day. All lights and decorations must be removed. Failure to remove decorations or placing the tree in a plastic bag will result in the tree not being collected that week, and the resident will have to wait until the following week.

Trees placed out after 7:00am on January 31st will not be collected.



HOLIDAY REMINDER: WASTE COLLECTION AND OFFICE CLOSURE

Due to the Christmas Holiday and New Year's Day, garbage and recycling collection will be delayed by one day for the weeks beginning December 25th and January 1st, 2024. Additionally, Village Offices will be closed on December 25th and 26th (Christmas Eve and Christmas Day Observed) and Monday, January 1st (New Year's Day).

WINTER HOME MAINTENANCE TIPS

Winter is on its way! It is important to protect the interior and exterior of your property from the cold weather. The following tips can help prepare your home for the winter season.

- 1. Protect Pipes: Maintain a consistent temperature of at least 60°F in all areas of your home, and properly seal all possible entry points for outdoor air to prevent freezing of water pipes.
- 2. Furnace Maintenance: Have an HVAC professional test and service your furnace annually to ensure all components are functioning properly.
- 3. Fireplace Maintenance: Before using your fireplace for the first time this season, thoroughly clean it by removing soot and debris from the firebox and chimney.

If your fireplace needs maintenance and/or repair, consult with a chimney sweeper or fireplace service technician.
