MAYOR'S MESSAGE

Dear Residents.

The holidays are upon us and so is shopping for your friends and loved ones. There is no question that living in the Village of Gurnee provides us with an amazing variety of opportunities to shop. However, one place that clearly leads the way is Gurnee Mills.

Gurnee Mills is located on 296 acres at the intersection of I-94 and Route 132. The mall was constructed in the early 1990s and is 2 million square feet with more than 200 shopping, entertainment and dining establishments housed under one roof. Gurnee Mills is quite the operation with more than 17 million visitors annually and an amazing occupancy rate of more than 95 percent. Not only is the mall tremendously successful, but so is the outer ring of businesses surrounding Gurnee Mills. Toys R Us has been vacant for years, but it now has an Ashley Furniture under construction. Right in front of Ashley Furniture and under construction is Texas Roadhouse. Also, the long vacant Saturn dealership has just been purchased by a car dealership and finally the Bakers Square building has been demolished and Bank of America is constructing a new banking facility on that site.

Over the last several years, I have been asked what I am going to do with the "failing" Gurnee Mills. It is commonly thought that online shopping has all but eliminated mall shopping, but Gurnee Mills has been more than equal to the task with fresh new offerings every month. The Gurnee Mills of today is not the Gurnee Mills of the 1990s. The entertainment mix continues to grow with Round1 (a 70,000 square foot arcade, bowling and kid's party complex), Top Shelf Ice Rink, Marcus Theater, Alpha Media radio station/show stage and more. Gurnee Mills is alive and well. As with any good business investment, Gurnee continues to wisely invest in Gurnee Mills through excellent Village services and financial incentives. Both have provided an excellent return on investment by providing an annual revenue of more than S6M. Revenue is important but the safety of those that visit takes priority. A recent addition of a mall canine officer, additional Gurnee Police Officers and the installation of Flock cameras (cameras that inform the Police Department of vehicles arriving at Gurnee Mills that have a correlation with crime) bolsters the already safe experience that visitors receive.

I grew up across the street from the farm that was to become Gurnee Mills and never did imagine what was to come. The only businesses that opened when I was a young boy were the Holiday Inn and the Shell gas station. Other than those businesses, it was farmland from I-94 west. As I have said in the past, my father did not like the change of farmland to businesses, so he sold our family home to Bob Rohrman of Rohrman Auto Group and moved to McHenry. I stayed and have enjoyed all that Gurnee has to offer, as well as the growth of my business as an attorney as the business community grew.

We cannot discuss the growth of Gurnee without at least mentioning our talented former Mayor Dick Welton, who was the mayor of Gurnee from 1972 to 2000. As Mayor Welton has passed, you will see Mayor Welton's wife, Debby Welton mentioned in the community spotlight article on the next page.

I encourage you to get out and see all that Gurnee Mills has to offer. Additionally, please take advantage of the various events offered in Gurnee this holiday season. The Turkey Trot on Thanksgiving, Holiday Lights at Welton Plaza on December 5th and the Holiday Train on December 7th are just a few events. Please come out and enjoy your family, friends and neighbors.

I pray that this upcoming year we enjoy all that God has gifted us and to especially appreciate those that He has placed in our lives. May you have a great Christmas and a Happy New Year.

ElderCARE Lake County Services

Transportation to Medical Appointments

At a typical visit to provide transportation, an ElderCARE volunteer escorts seniors to their vehicle, takes them to their medical appointment and returns them back home. ElderCARE also assists with drop-off and pick-up from lengthy appointments such as dialysis. Please provide at least 10 days notice when requesting. One ride per week may be scheduled.

Grocery Shopping

Do you or a senior that you know need assistance getting groceries? Access to healthy food is important. Through ElderCARE grocery shopping service, volunteers take the grocery list and make the trip to the store. Seniors pay for the groceries and the service is free.

Basic Technology Program

Whether it's a phone, tablet or computer, ElderCARE can help seniors with technology, so they can stay connected to family and doctors.

Friendly Visits

Living alone can be challenging, especially when it's tough to get out and interact with others. ElderCARE's friendly visits services provide an opportunity for seniors to develop lasting friendships by phone or over a cup of tea or a game.

The Warren Township Center offers a wide variety of senior activities such as luncheons, fitness classes, trips and various games. These activities fill up fast, so please call the Senior Center at 847-244-1101 ext. *501 for registration dates, class dates and additional information. Also, for anyone looking for support as they go through any life change, support group meets Wednesdays from 1:30pm to 3:00pm.

Social and Financial Services

The Senior Center has a Social Service staff ready to assist residents. Information and help can be provided in applying for federal, state and local programs including Medicare and social security information and assistance. Their trained Senior Health Insurance Program (SHIP) counselors are available by appointment to provide information and assistance navigating the Medicare and Social Security process and what seniors need to know to avoid penalties as well as one-on-one assistance with Enrollment Advantage Plans Supplements/Medigap, Medicare Savings Program, and Prescription Drug Plans/Part D Insurance Claims.

Utility and Financial Assistance Programs

Information, screening and assistance is provided for applying for and maintaining eligibility for different programs such as: LIHEAP (Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program), a federal/state program for those eligible to receive yearly credit on gas and electric bills; Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)/Food; Medicaid; and Prescription Drug Assistance.




- Balanced Budget and Minimized Debt: Continued to pass a balanced budget and decrease debt.
- Provided Value Back: Through not levying a property tax or a utility tax, the Village saved approximately \$6,500 per homeowner over 10 years (Based on the average home value of \$330,000 and the property tax levy of neighboring communities). Gurnee also has the lowest water rate among CLCJAWA towns.
- Maintained Business Relationships: Strengthened relationships with Six Flags, Great Wolf Lodge and Gurnee Mills, which combined provides 33% of all General Fund revenues.
- Small Business Grant Program: Awarded over \$500k in grants over 3 yrs., spurring over \$4M in improvements.
- Investing in Infrastructure: 6.5 miles of roadway rehabilitated last year as part of the largest Capital Program in Gurnee's history.

SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENTS AND SEASONAL REMINDERS

GURNEE'S SNOW AND ICE CONTROL



With the onset of the winter season, the Gurnee Public Works Department would like to offer the following information to keep in mind as snow plowing operations begin.

Village plowing operations commence when the snow begins to accumulate and temperatures indicate that no melting will occur. The Village plows only municipally-owned streets. The Village of Gurnee is bisected by a number of State of Illinois and Lake County arterial highways which are not maintained/plowed by the Village. Routes 132, 120, 45, 41 and 21 are plowed and maintained by the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT). Hunt Club, Washington, O'Plaine, Greenleaf (south of Washington), Dilley's (north of Rt. 132),

Gages Lake, Delany (north of Rt. 41), Sunset and Stearns School are plowed and maintained by the Lake County Division of Transportation (LCDOT).

The following tips help ensure snow and ice control operations proceed smoothly:

- 1. When clearing sidewalks and driveways, do not shovel, blow or plow snow onto the roadway.
- 2. When it starts to snow, park your vehicle off of the street.
- 3. Please try to clear the snow around fire hydrants. This simple step could save precious time during an emergency.
- 4. Please remove portable basketball hoops, benches and decor from the street right-of-way. The Village is not responsible for damage to these items resulting from our snow removal operations.
- 5. To minimize snow deposits at the end of your driveway, try not to create large piles of snow in the parkway on the upstream side. While it's frustrating to shovel your driveway only to have the plow come by and push snow back at the base, it is not feasible to plow the street so that your driveway remains completely "snow free." Roadway design, the type of equipment that is utilized and the severity of snow events all factor into the size of the windrow left in the plow's wake.

REUSE-A-SHOE COLLECTION BIN MOVED TO PUBLIC WORKS FACILITY

The Reuse-A-Shoe Collection Bin has been moved to the Gurnee Public Works Facility at 1151 Kilbourne Ave. Open daily for drop-off anytime, here are some important things to remember: All types, sizes and brands are accepted. If a pair, please keep shoes paired by tying, banding, or bagging them together. NOT ACCEPTED Items include but are not limited to ice skates, rollerblades, winter boots, moldy shoes or badly damaged shoes. By using this reuse bin, you're helping reduce waste and contributing to a greener Gurnee!

CHRISTMAS TREE PICK UP BEGINS THURSDAY, JANUARY 2

Lakeshore Recycling Systems will be collecting Christmas trees on your regular service day throughout the month of January.

In order for a tree to be collected, it must be placed at the curb or the edge of the street by 6:00am on the pick-up day. All lights and decorations must be removed. Failure to remove decorations or placing the tree in a plastic bag will result in the tree not being collected that week and the resident will have to wait until the following week. Please note that only real trees are accepted.

Trees placed out after your final collection for January will not be picked up.



HOLIDAY REMINDER: WASTE COLLECTION AND OFFICE CLOSURE

Due to the Christmas Holiday and New Year's Day, if your garbage and recycling falls on or after Wednesday, December 25th (Christmas Day) or Wednesday, January 1st (New Year's Day) then your collection will be delayed by one day for that week. Also, Village offices will be closed on December 24th and 25th (Christmas Eve and Christmas Day) as well as Wednesday, January 1st (New Year's Day).

WINTER HOME MAINTENANCE TIPS

Winter is on its way! It is important to protect the interior and exterior of your property from the cold weather. The following tips can help prepare your home for the winter season.

- 1. Protect Pipes: Maintain a consistent temperature of at least 60°F in all areas of your home, and properly seal all possible entry points for outdoor air to prevent freezing of water pipes.
- 2. Furnace Maintenance: Have an HVAC professional test and service your furnace annually to ensure all components are functioning properly.
- 3. Fireplace Maintenance: Before using your fireplace for the first time this season, thoroughly clean it by removing soot and debris from the firebox and chimney.

If your fireplace needs maintenance and/or repair, consult with a chimney sweeper or fireplace service technician.
