GURNEE, IL – The Village of Gurnee is proud to announce the 2024 Gurnee Teacher of the Year Award Recipients: John Bird (Warren Township High School District 121), Carrie Monterroso (Woodland District 50), and Stephanie Esteban (Gurnee District 56).

These prestigious awards are a testament to the collaborative efforts of the Village, local school districts, and business owner Donald Henderson, under the leadership of Mayor Tom Hood. These awards recognize the outstanding achievements of peer-nominated recipients from each district for their exceptional service to students, schools, and the community.

Mr. John Bird of Warren Township High School District 121 was awarded as one of Gurnee's Teachers of the Year. John has worked in education and social services for over 30 years. He began his career at the Dislocated Workers Center at Illinois Valley Community College, where he worked as the Employer Relations Representative.
